## ACCOUNT OF THE MAIN EVENTS IN THE ISRAEL-HAMAS WAR AND HOSTILITIES BY THE IRANIAN AXIS

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## **OVERVIEW**

- Hamas has handed over the body of fallen IDF soldier Hadar Goldin, who was killed in Operation Protective Edge (2014) and whose body has been held in Gaza for the past 4,117 days.
- ◆ U.S. envoy Witkoff met Hamas political leader Khalil al-Hayya in Cairo. Al-Hayya allegedly committed that Hamas would hand over its heavy weapons to an international stabilization force (ISF) to be deployed in Gaza.
- Responsibility for humanitarian aid entry into Gaza has been transferred from COGAT (Israeli Coordination Unit) to U.S. military command, marking a major shift in operational control. American officers will now supervise all aid deliveries.
- ◆ The IDF subsequently struck six villages in Lebanon, targeting Radwan Force weapons depots, terror infrastructure, and engineering equipment, and conducted two vehicle strikes killing two militants.
- Austrian intelligence uncovered a Hamas weapons depot in central Vienna, containing pistols and ammunition hidden in a suitcase.

## **MAIN EVENTS**

Hamas Conceals Identities: Hamas instructed Gazans and local media not to reveal the identities of militants killed on October 7, fearing exposure of remaining operational networks.

Claims of Disarmament: U.S. envoy Steve Witkoff stated that Hamas pledged to disarm, while Hamas publicly insists it will retain its weapons.

International Pressure on Israel: Turkey issued arrest warrants for senior Israeli officials, and a Hamas weapons cache intended for attacks on Jewish institutions was uncovered in Vienna.



## **CEASEFIRE**

- Hamas has handed over the body of fallen IDF soldier Hadar Goldin, who was killed in Operation Protective Edge (2014) and whose body has been held in Gaza ever since.
- U.S. envoy Witkoff met Hamas political leader Khalil al-Hayya in Cairo. Al-Hayya allegedly committed that Hamas would hand over its heavy weapons to an international stabilization force (ISF) to be deployed in Gaza. The process would begin with two Hamas holdout units of resistance surrendering their arms in exchange for amnesty, forming a "model of disarmament" for the rest of Gaza. Militants from the Jenina neighborhood (Rafah area) are expected to surrender their arms to the mediators, receive amnesty, and be allowed to relocate to Hamas-controlled zones of Gaza. Washington was said to view the effort as a pilot program for a broader decommissioning and amnesty initiative for Hamas fighters, part of US President Donald Trump's 20-point plan.
- Turkish mediator and spymaster, Ibrahim Kalin, met with Al-Hayya to promote the ceasefire, while senior Hamas official, Mousa Abu Marzouk told Al Jazeera that Hamas would not fully disarm, exposing ongoing disagreement with the U.S., which insists on moving into "Phase B" of the plan.



## International Stabilization Force (ISF)

◆ The ISF will be subordinate to the "Peace Council", under American—not UN—oversight. It will act as an enforcement mission, not a peacekeeping one, with deployment scheduled for January 2026 and a mandate until end-2027, with a mechanism to extend mandate.

## Its duties will include:

- Securing crossings, humanitarian routes, and supply convoys.
- Training local police until the Palestinian Authority (PA) can assume control after significant internal reforms.
- **Dismantling Hamas' military infrastructure** and preventing future rearmament.
- The specific countries participating in the ISF have not yet been publicized.
- Qatar supports the U.S. proposal before the UN Security
  Council, offering financial support for the ISF but refusing to send troops.
- ◆ Azerbaijan opposes troop deployment until a full ceasefire is in effect, agreeing only to a peace-preserving role, not disarmament enforcement.
- ◆ The **U.S.** ambassador to the **UN** met with senior **PA** officials to discuss the ISF mandate, indicating **Washington's openness**—under regional pressure—to involve the PA in Gaza's post-war governance.
- Meanwhile, Egypt and Jordan are training up to 3,000 PA police officers for eventual deployment inside Gaza.



## **OPERATIONAL**

- Shejaiya continues to be systematically demolished amid controlled detonations.
- In Rafah, engineering units are conducting tunnel-clearing operations in the Jenin sub-district, while in eastern Khan Younis (Abasan al-Kabira and Bani Suheila), the IDF targets the remaining pockets of resistance.
- Israel's objective is to force the surrender of these units without granting amnesty, in contrast to U.S. proposals.

## HUMANITARIAN

- Responsibility for humanitarian aid entry into Gaza has been transferred from COGAT (Israeli Coordination Unit) to U.S. military command, marking a major shift in operational control. American officers will now supervise all aid deliveries.
- Israel retains authority to approve or deny entry of strategic materials and maintains security control over crossings, but it no longer oversees food distribution, signaling a deepening American administrative role inside Gaza.

- ◆ The Knesset approved a new death penalty bill for terrorists. Under the proposed law, any perpetrator who murders an Israeli citizen due to nationalist or racist motives will face capital punishment. The initiative reflects growing public and political pressure following October 7 and aims to strengthen deterrence against future attacks.
- Generals Sami Turgeman and Eyal Zamir presented their October 7th failure report to Defense Minister Israel Katz, marking a critical internal review phase within the IDF.
- Yerushalmi was released to house arrest from police custody after she went missing on a beach and a week after she resigned from her post and admitted to leaking a classified video from the Sde Teiman scandal. She appears to have discarded her phone by hiding it the sea, in what seems to be an attempt to obstruct justice. Her phone was later found. She is currently hospitalized after she attempted to commit suicide after she was surprisingly released on Friday to house arrest and without supervision.
- ◆ The IAF and the Hellenic Air Force conducted a joint aerial exercise over Greek airspace, including aerial refueling drills with dozens of Greek fighter jets.



- Drone-based smuggling from Egypt and Jordan has sharply increased.
  - On Nov 5, in the Yoav Brigade (southern Jordan border), troops intercepted a drone carrying 10 pistols and magazines.
  - Later, on Nov 7, Paran Brigade troops intercepted two additional drones on the Egyptian border—one carrying three M-16 rifles, another containing 48 pistols and 51 magazines.
- Following these incidents, Defense Minister Katz ordered eased engagement rules and declared the border area a closed military zone, reflecting growing concern over weapons and narcotics smuggling.



- Two brigade-level operations were completed across the sector, involving 80 site raids, over 60 arrests, and seizure of weapons, including handguns, six IEDs, and an M-16 rifle.
- ◆ The Gideonim Unit (Israel Police) conducted a daytime raid on the Ramallah market, arresting a cell leader in cooperation with IDF's Binyamin Brigade and Shin Bet.



- ◆ The IDF issued evacuation warnings in three southern Lebanese villages, within a 500-meter radius of targeted buildings, prompting the fleeing of many civilians and immense traffic congestion due to panic.
- The IDF subsequently struck six villages, targeting Radwan Force weapons depots, terror infrastructure, and engineering equipment, and conducted two vehicle strikes killing two militants.
- ◆ The Institute for the Study of War (ISW) reported 93 Israeli strikes in Lebanon between Aug 7 Nov 3, mostly south of the Litani and near Nabatieh.

### POLITICAL AND REGIONAL REACTIONS

- ♦ Lebanese President Michel Aoun condemned the Israeli strikes, accusing Jerusalem of sabotaging bilateral negotiations.
- The Lebanese Army Chief threatened to suspend Hezbollah disarmament efforts while Israeli operations continue.
- ◆ Egypt's intelligence minister, visiting Beirut, proposed a Hezbollah withdrawal south of the Litani River and cessation of attacks in return for restraint by Israel. However, he observed Israel's resolve to expand operations against the Iranian-led axis (Hezbollah, Houthis, Iraqi militias).
- U.S. envoy David Barak urged Aoun to begin direct talks with Israel as Jerusalem threatened to strike Beirut's Dahiyeh district over Hezbollah's disarmament delays.
- Gulf States reportedly offered Lebanon \$16 billion in reconstruction aid if Shiite militias disarm.
- Meanwhile, the U.S. Treasury imposed sanctions on Lebanese figures involved in oil and cash smuggling from Iran, estimated at \$1 billion since January.



- On Nov 5, Reuters reported that the U.S. plans to establish a command post in Damascus to monitor a security arrangement between Israel and Syria.
- On Nov 6, Damascus officially denied the report, though analysts suggest Washington may seek to station a joint monitoring mission along the border, resembling the 1974 disengagement framework.



- According to The Wall Street Journal, the **Houthi army** has **expanded dramatically** from approximately **30,000 fighters in 2015 to 350,000 in 2024.**
- ◆ The movement is reportedly seeking full self-sufficiency in arms production, reducing reliance on Iranian supplies, and is determined to dominate all of Yemen.
- This signifies a shift from a proxy-based structure to a localized military-industrial force, posing increased regional challenges to Saudi and maritime security interests.






Iranian commemorating the anniversary of the American embassy takeover in 1979 as anti-Western imperialism day.

- Iran has **increased support** for **Iraqi Shiite militias** after internal unrest, reorganizing them as a **frontline defense** against Israel for a potential future war.
- Iraqi PM al-Sudani stated disarmament of these militias would occur only after a full U.S. withdrawal.
- ◆ ISW reported that since Oct 31, Iran's Deputy Chief of Staff visited eight IRGC and Artesh bases, signaling combat readiness preparations.
- Tehran claimed a cyberattack on Israel's Rafael defense company, allegedly stealing sensitive data on "Or Eitan" laser defense, David's Sling, and a new cruise missile. Rafael denied any breach of classified systems, clarifying the hack targeted a civilian subcontractor managing exhibition models.





Meanwhile, the head of Iran's Atomic Energy Organization announced plans, in coordination with Russia, to build eight new nuclear reactors, reinforcing the Moscow-Tehran strategic energy axis.

- Revolution Anniversary (Nov 4): Iran marked the anniversary of the 1979 U.S. Embassy takeover in Tehran, when 52 American diplomats were held hostage until January 1981. The regime commemorated the event as "Day of Struggle Against Western Imperialism", holding nationwide rallies where U.S. and Israeli flags were burned, reaffirming the Islamic Republic's anti-Western ideological foundation.
- ◆ Iran continues organizing Iraqi Shiite militias as a frontline against Israel, while ISW reported Iranian military visits to eight IRGC and Artesh bases since October 31 an indicator of strategic mobilization toward a potential future confrontation.

- ◆ CENTCOM announced expanded defense cooperation with Qatar, including reinforcement of Qatari air defense systems.
- ◆ Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman is expected in Washington on Nov 18, seeking a defense pact and advanced U.S. weaponry in exchange for normalization with Israel, partly to counter Qatar's rising influence.
- President Trump declared that Kazakhstan will join the Abraham Accords, becoming the first new signatory in his second term, leveraging its oil exports to Israel to boost U.S. diplomatic momentum ahead of upcoming visits by Syrian President al-Sharaa and bin Salman.
- ◆ The Istanbul Attorney General issued arrest warrants for 37 Israeli officials, including the Prime Minister, Defense Minister, IDF Chief of Staff, and National Security Minister, on charges of "genocide in Gaza."
- Colombian President Gustavo Petro arrived in Doha to meet the Qatari Emir, seeking mediation with Donald Trump amid rising diplomatic tensions between Bogotá and Washington. Petro, known for his pro-Hamas sympathies, is relying on Qatar's mediation services to restore relations with the U.S., highlighting Doha's growing centrality as a regional intermediary.





- A senior German military officer stated that Germany should purchase Turkish drones to bolster its defenses after Russia's invasion of Ukraine, suggesting Berlin's strategic reassessment of defense procurement.
- In Greece, Defense Minister Nikos Dendias warned that
  Turkey could only join the EU defense framework under strict
  European conditions and values, reflecting ongoing Greek Turkish friction within NATO and the EU.
- ◆ The European Commission also hinted that it may block defense cooperation initiatives with Turkey, citing human rights and governance concerns.
- Austrian intelligence uncovered a Hamas weapons depot in central Vienna, containing pistols and ammunition hidden in a suitcase, allegedly intended for attacks on Jewish and Israeli institutions.
